Immigration Terms: The Basics

- United States Citizen (USC)
- Lawful Permanent Resident (LPR)
- Nonimmigrant (temporary)
- DACA deferred action





Undocumented

- Person in the US without legal immigration status.
- Does not have "documents" or "papers"
- Entered the U.S. with a visa, but overstayed
- Entered without inspection (illegally)



Key Players

- Department of Homeland Security (DHS)
 - Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)
 - Customs and Border Protection (CBP)
 - United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS)

Special Immigrant Juvenile Status (SIJS)

 SIJS is a way for certain undocumented children to apply for lawful permanent residency (LPR)

SIJS Basics

- Dependent upon the juvenile court or placed under the custody of, an agency or department of a State, or an individual
- Reunification with one or both parents is not viable due to abuse, neglect, or abandonment, or a similar basis under State law; and
- Not in the child's "best interest" to be returned to home country

Juvenile Court must have jurisdiction

- Juvenile (dependency or delinquency), probate, and family courts
- SIJS applicants must be under the jurisdiction of the court to obtain the Order necessary to apply for SIJS

SIJS: Reunification with parent

- Children who live with <u>both</u> parents are NOT eligible for SIJS
- Children who live with <u>neither</u> parent MAY be eligible for SIJS via dependency, delinquency, adoption, or probate guardianship proceedings
- Children who live with <u>one</u> parent MAY be eligible for SIJS via dependency, delinquency, or adoption proceedings

U nonimmigrant status (U Visa)

- Survivors of crimes such as domestic violence, child abuse, sexual abuse and other serious crimes in the U.S.
- Cooperation with law enforcement
- Parent victim can petition for child
- Child victim can petition for parent



Eligibility Requirements

- Suffered (a) substantial physical or mental abuse as a result of having been (b) a victim of (c) certain criminal activity.
- > Helpful in the investigation or prosecution.
- Crime violated the laws of the United States or occurred in the United States.

Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA)

- Temporary authorization to be present in the U.S. during period of deferred action, <u>but does not grant lawful</u>
 <u>status</u>
- Form of prosecutorial discretion
 - A person's removal is not a priority and thus deferred.
 - DHS "defers action" on the case.
- 2-year employment authorization
- Eligible to apply for:
 - Restricted Social Security Card
 - CA driver's license



Rescinded on September 5, 2017

What now?

- Cannot apply for (new) initial DACA.
- If filed DACA prior to September 5, 2017, DHS will adjudicate application.
- If status expires before March 5, 2018, final deadline to renew was on October 5, 2017.
- If filed by October 5, likely renew for 2 full years.
- If status expires after March 5, 2018, cannot renew.
- Can replace work permit if lost, but cannot renew.
 - DACA & work permit expire on date shown on approval notice and work permit.
- Right to work legally until work permit expires.

What's next?

- Once current period of DACA expires, no longer hold deferred action or work authorization
- Social security number remains valid for life
 - Use for education, banking, housing, etc.
- Slightly greater risk of removal
- USCIS will not refer DACA recipients to ICE unless risk to national security or public safety
- 1000 Dreamers per day, 30,000 per month will lose work authorization
- Think creative: Independent Contractor



AB 540

- Pay in-state tuition
- Community college
- University of California
- California State University

• AB 540 Requirements:

- Attended CA high school for 3 or more years
- <u>Or</u> credits from a CA high school equivalent of 3 or more years of high school coursework & 3 or more years in CA elementary schools, secondary school or a combination

All public colleges and

universities in California

- Graduated from CA high school, GED, HiSET or TASC
- Register or enroll in college or university
- AB 540 Affidavit
- Do not hold a non-immigrant visa

What is an AB 540 Affidavit?

Simple one-page form

What does the affidavit ask?

- Verify educational requirements.
- Certify student is in process of legalizing immigration status or will file "an application" as soon as eligible.
- Does not hold a non-immigrant visa.



Signed under penalty of perjury

What else do I need?

- AB 540 Affidavit
- Transcripts
- Graduation records or equivalent
- Submit BEFORE you pay tuition and fees
- Submit the semester before you attend school
- Confidential (and protected under federal and state laws)

Do I need a social security number to apply for college?

- You do not need a social security number
- If you have a valid social security number, valid for life



Valid even after work permit & DACA expire

Can I use an ITIN?

- Not necessary for college application.
- Individual Tax Payer Number (ITIN)
 - If not eligible for SSN
 - Use to open a bank account (with ID)
 - Use to file state and federal tax forms & report earnings
 - Use if independent contractor
 - For self-employment tax and income tax
 - How to apply? File Form W-7 with the IRS

California Dream Act www.caldreamact.org

- Undocumented students are not eligible for Federal Financial Aid and must <u>not</u> submit a FAFSA.
- This includes AB 540 students
- This includes DACA students
- Apply if not eligible for FAFSA

GENERALLY NO ENFORCEMENT

- Limits enforcement actions
- Not a complete prohibition (exceptions national security/danger to public)
- Remains in force today, but can be withdrawn or amended at any time

AT SENSITIVE LOCATIONS

- Preschools, primary schools, secondary schools, postsecondary schools, colleges and universities, vocational or trade schools [FAQs: + school bus stop, school activities]
- Hospitals [FAQs: + Dr. office]
- Places or Worship
- Public religious ceremony
- Public demonstrations

JUDICIAL WARRANT

- If agent seeks to search area with reasonable expectation of privacy, 4th amend protection, requires judicial warrant
- Warrant signed by a **judge** or **magistrate**

ADMINISTRATIVE WARRANT



- Warrant based on Removal Order (I-205)
- ICE Warrant of Arrest, (I-200)
- Only grants agents authority to enter areas where no reasonable expectation of privacy (public space)

What if ICE Shows up at college campus? For areas not open to the public

Don't let ICE onto campus (nonpublic areas) without a warrant

Student rights

Are there laws that prevent schools from sharing student information?

- The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) and other privacy laws ensure the privacy of educational records
- FERPA requires schools to maintain confidentiality of all student records.
- Schools are prohibited from providing information from a student's file that shows immigration status to immigration (unless they have consent)
- See familypolicy.ed.gov/ferpa-parents-students.

ICE Does not have a Right to Access Private Student Records

- Schools may not release information about students' immigration status to ICE unless required by a judicial order, warrant, subpoena
- If served with a subpoena for student's immigration status, make reasonable efforts to notify the student or parent before disclosing anything
 - Student/parent can seek protective action.
 - Consult with general counsel.
- Exceptions, *e.g.* terrorism investigation

CREATE TOOLS TO PROTECT STUDENTS

- Does school have a written policy on:
 - Interaction with ICE?
 - Requests for information from ICE?
- Which areas of campus are protected?
- Are policies online?

POLICIES

- Create a **policy** to limit cooperation with ICE (e.g. "Sanctuary policy")
- Make sure disciplinary policies don't involve law enforcement [stop prison pipeline]
- Train staff how to respond to ICE requests for information or to enter school grounds
- Minimize when students need to disclose their status.
- Data collection: Don't ask questions about immigration status of parent or student

Possible Safeguards & Sanctuary Policies

January 25, 2017 Executive Orders on Enforcement

ALL UNDOCUMENTED PERSONS ARE NOW AN ENFORCEMENT PRIORITY

- Officers instructed to arrest anyone who they have probable cause to believe is in violation of immigration laws.
- > This includes a person who overstayed his visa.
- > All are a priority.
